I believe you are the victim of a Military Romance scam, while the person you are talking to is a foreign national acting as an American soldier claiming to be stationed overseas on a peacekeeping mission. That's the key to the fraud they always claim to be on a peacekeeping mission. Part of their scam says they don't have access to their money, that their mission is very dangerous. If your friend's girlfriend/future spouse asks you to do the following or exhibit this behavior, it's most likely a scam: It moves to a private messaging page immediately after meeting you on Facebook or SnapChat or Instagram or some dating or social media sites. Often times they delete the site you met them on right after they asked you to move to a more private messaging siteProfesses love to you very quickly & seems to quote poems and song lyrics along with using their own sort of their broken language, as they profess love and devotion quickly. They also showed interest in your health and love for your family. It promises marriage as soon as it gets to the state on holiday that they have asked you to pay. It asks for money (bank transfers) and Amazon, iTune, Verizon, etc. gift cards, for medicine, religious practices, and letters to return home, internet access, complete work tasks, help a sick friend, get him out of trouble, or anything that sounds fishy. The army provides all the needs of the soldier, including food medical care and transportation for the holidays. Believe me, I've lived it, you're probably cheated. I'm just trying to show you examples that you're most likely duped. Below is the email reply I received after I sent a query to the U.S. government when I found out that I I got this wonderful answer back with lots of helpful links on how to find and report your scammer. And as you learn more about Romance Scams.Right now you can also copy the image he gave you and do a google image search and you will hopefully see pictures of the real person he is impersonating. it doesn't always work and take some digging. If you find a real person, you can directly message them and alert them that their image is being used for scamming. Good luck, and I'm sorry this could happen to you. please continue reading the government reply I got below it's very informative. You contacted an email monitoring the U.S. Army's Criminal Investigation Command. Unfortunately, it is a common problem. Please be assured that there is never any reason to send money to anyone who claims to be a soldier online. If you've only spoken to this person online, chances are they're not an American soldier at all. If it is a suspicious social media profile, we invite you to report it to this platform as soon as possible. In theory, people who are well informed about history, culture, science, mathematics, etc., and are capable of critical, impartial thinking, will have the tools to participate in democracy and make good decisions for themselves and for society as a whole. In addition, they should learn how to be students, how to do it effectively, basic research and collaborate with other people. If that happens, ingesting out how to do procedural tasks in real life shouldn't provide much of a challenge. We can't possibly teach all the necessary life skills people need, but we can help students know better how to get the skills they need. Should we teach them how to change a tire when they can easily peek into a book or search the internet to find step by step instructions on it? We should teach them how to balance a checkbook or teach them how to think mathematically and have a sense of trouble so that the simple task of balancing a checkbook (which requires simple arithmetic and the ability to type numbers and words into columns and rows in obvious ways) is easy for them to figure out. If we teach them to be good at critical thinking and have some problem solving skills, they will be able to apply these overarching skills to all sorts of everyday tasks that shouldn't be difficult for someone with decent cognitive ability to figure it out. It's analogous to asking why culinary schools didn't teach their students the steps and ingredients of a particular recipe. The school taught them about more general food preparation and food science skills so that they could easily figure out how to make many specific recipes. They are also able to create their own recipes. So we want citizens with the very specific sets of skills they need to to daily life, or do we want citizens with critical thinking, problem solving, and other overarching cognitive skills that allow them to easily acquire some simple, procedural skills that can come into need at any time in life? Years ago, I worked at a document management company. There is cool software that can automate aspects of hand-written forms. We had an airport as a customer – scanned a lot and (as I said before), it was a few years ago... At your airport customs forms, the boxes you 'need' to write on - they are basically invisible to the scanner - but they are used because then us people will tend to write nicer and brighter, making it easier to sit recognize with your computer. All characters with less than X% accuracy based on the recognition tool are marked and displayed as an image magnified to a specific character, so the human operator can then say it is A. This way you can quickly go through most forms and output it to say – SQL database, complete with a link to the original image of the form that you filled out. If you see black boxes in three corners of the document - it is probably set to scan (help identify and orient the page digitally). If there is a unique barcode on the document somewhere where I theoteoteize, it is even more likely to be scanned - the document is of sufficient value to be printed individually, which costs more, which means it is likely to be used on the capture page. (I've noticed in the past in the Bahamas and some other Caribbean islands that use these kinds of capture mechanisms, but have far fewer people entering than the U.S. does every day) The real answer is: it matters. Depending on each country and its policies and practices. In general, I would be surprised if scanned and held on paper. In the US, they probably file those for a certain period of time then destroy them, perhaps extracting them for some passenger data. In the end, I suspect that the paper-to-date capture probability of customs forms moves somewhere on a spectrum like this: Third World Customs officer has a paper to show he has done his job, the paper gets thrown out at the end of the shift. -----> get all the papers! Everything is scanned as you go through customs and unique barcodes to determine which flight/gate/area the form was handed out to, so we coordinate with the cameras at the airport and captured your picture. We also know exactly how much vodka you brought into the country. :) I strongly recommend buying a tax program.
